
ATTITUDE OF GRATITUDE LUKE 17:11-19

October 9 — Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost
Sermon Title: "Not What I Want But..."

This past week, the Atlanta Braves won their fifth consecutive division championship. It's been an amazing run for the Braves this past year. Many of their fans, including some sports media, had given up on the Braves since they were so far behind the then first place, New York Mets, at the end of May. With a couple of personnel changes being made, the Braves' team began to turn things around. They slowly began to make up ground on the Mets and were eventually able to catch them the last week of the season. This led to a three-game series between the Mets and Braves which would end up determining who would win the division crown and one who would end up being one of the three Wild Card teams.
